# Our So(u)rcerers - They Make the Magic Happen



Among our suppliers, **Earth's Palate Farm** stands out: Since 2017, co-owner **Renée Giroux** runs **NWCT Food Hub**, connecting 30 area farmers and their produce with wholesale buyers "who want to know where their food comes from." Giroux's greenhouses yield lettuce all winter, with up to 200 heads per week going to The Corner Food Pantry. Summer brings a bumper crop of fruit and vegetables. The reward for 80 hour work-weeks? "Farmers working together instead of against each other," says Giroux. Her husband, Kevin MacPherson, is also a pastry chef known for his croissants and hand-made chocolates, available at their farm store in Warren on Saturday mornings.

We have a nickname for the butchers in the meat department of **BJ's** in **Torrington**: We call them our "Knights of the Knives." **Ed, Mark and Joe** are equipped with chain mail gloves and ultra sharp blades. The crew proved to be a reliable source of chicken, even when poultry was extremely tough to come by during the pandemic. At our request, the men now cut and wrap up to 300 individual servings of pork chops when we order them - all while giving us the best price they can find. A tremendous amount of extra work for the dedicated team; they are firmly committed to our goal of putting a dent into food insecurity in Connecticut's Northwest Corner.





With Q Farms, Linda and James Quella established a reputation for the outstanding taste of their grass-fed cattle, sheep, chicken and cage-free eggs. For the past three years, the enterprising couple have shared the harvest generated from their property near Sharon Mountain with generous donations to The Corner Food Pantry. To further strengthen access to healthy food in our region, the Quellas plan to lease 40 acres to livestock breeders and vegetable growers on favorable terms - including the superb infrastructure that is already in place, from water supply and electricity to storage coolers. Their new nonprofit **Tri Corner FEED** is designed to support both local food producers and food pantries. "It's a double bottom line."

Adamah is the Hebrew word for soil and the name of the farming venture of the Isabella Freedman Jewish Retreat Center in Falls Village. For the past 12 years, Janna Siller has been teaching her passion for growing vegetables to twenty to thirty visiting fellows a year. They come from all over the country and help Siller produce 7,000 pounds of food per season for local pantries, on top of 12,000 pounds for the center's CSA and another 10,000 for consumption in their own dining hall. Fellows also learn about subjects like ecology, cheesemaking, pickling, and community building. "Some go back to be lawyers or whatever they were before they came here, and some have gone on to be farmers."

For LaBonne's Market, community outreach is an important cornerstone of their family-run business, now in its sixth generation. That commitment includes partnering with TCFP. On a weekly basis, our volunteers place an order



at the Salisbury store for food staples such as fresh milk, bread, bananas and more - items that make up our basic menu. We simply could not run our program without the support that the entire staff, including dairy manager **Veronica**, general manager **Eric** and the head of the produce department **Kevin**, give us. On top of their service, LaBonne's sponsors a yearly Charity Golf Tournament. Proceeds go to pantries in the towns where LaBonne's stores are located - a fun way to contribute to a great cause.

### By the Numbers

In 2022, an average of 96 families came to the pantry every week, representing more than 400 individuals. In the first quarter of 2023, the number of households climbed to 115 a week, a 20% increase over 2022. We are seeing a consistent uptick in the number of new families from our surrounding towns registering each week. Our cost and the demand for volunteers have gone up considerably, and we are counting on your support. Without your donations, the pantry couldn't function. Thank you.


#### More Mad Gratitude!
